We have overhauled the students and accounting software.

We have introduced online admission system of UG 1st year students as per direction of the Government of West Bengal.

We have procured good number ICT equipment for academic as well administrative departments of College under Rastriya Uchatar Siksha Abhiyan.

We have procured good number text books, reference books and research oriented books for our central library under Rastriya Uchatara Siksha Abhiyan.

6.3.6 Human Resource Management

With a view to ensuring optimum utilization of manpower we introduced systematic distribution of work load among our staff members with due consultation with NTS Council as well as Joint Council of faculty members and staff members. We also appointed one Sweeper on daily wage basis with a view to overcoming the problem of permanent staff. The Governing Body of the College has also formed one Pay Review Committee to settle the pay related issues of the casual and daily paid workers.

Last year UGC XIIth Plan Planning Board organized one Workshop on Self-employment under UGC XIIth Plan Competence Building Programme for the interest enhancing awareness among the students about Self-employment.

Last year we appointed one Guest faculty in Mathematics in the department of Commerce. We have also submitted necessary requisitions to the West Bengal College Service Commission for appointment eight more whole time faculties.

We are also maintain necessary communication with the department of Higher Education, Govt. of West Bengal for having approval for recruitment of new permanent staff members.



Annexure-III

Details of Management Information System

Administrative procedures including finance:

In the matter of administration the Governing Body of the College is the supreme authority. It formulates its administrative plans and programmes on the basis of recommendation of different sub-committees and rules, regulations, bye-laws framed time to time by the Government of West Bengal, University Grants Commission and the affiliating University i.e. University of Kalyani. At the interval of each period it evaluates whether those plans are properly implemented and finds out the problems in implementation of the same and adopts ways to overcome the situation.

In the matter of finance it prepares an annual budget of its income and expenditure on the basis of recommendation of the Finance Committee. The Finance Committee recommends the budget on the basis of past three years experience as well as rules, regulations, bye-laws framed time to time by the Government of West Bengal, University Grants Commission and the affiliating University i.e. University of Kalyani. At the interval of a particular period it reviews its budgeted actions and finds the way to overcome the situation.

Student admission:

In the matter of admission the Institution follows admission rules framed by the affiliating University. However internal rules and regulation regarding admission are recommended by the Teachers' Council following the guideline of the affiliating University.

Student records:

Student records of the College are maintained by using student software package. Generally student data are uploaded at cash counter where the students deposit their fees at the time of admission. Then those student data are disseminated to different segments like Academic Council, Teachers' Council, different academic departments and Internal Quality Assurance Cell

Evaluation and examination procedures:

Generally in the matter of evaluation and examination of the students of the College we follow the rules and regulations framed by the University. However it arranges Test Examination following the framework of University level of Examination for the students every year. Students, who qualify at the test examination are allowed for appearing at the University Examination and the students, who cannot are allowed at the consent of their guardian.

Further after publication of result of final University level Examination each of the academic departments evaluates the results of their students and presents the same to the College Governing Body through the Academic Council and recommends the name of the students, who are eligible for felicitation for their academic excellence and specific actions to be adopted for overcoming the challenges if any.

Research administration: Research activities of the College are generally conducted by the Seminar & Research Forum. The Seminar & Research Forum looks after the organization of Seminars by the different academic departments, research projects, conducted by the faculty members , participation and publication of the faculty members in different faculty development programmes.

Others:

Apart from above the College takes specific plans in various supporting activities like cultural programmes, games & sports, community extension programme, social action programmes based on science and environment through its various organs. At a specific interval it evaluates its performance in those activities and finds the ways to overcome the identified problems.

1. Title of the Practice

2. Goal

The main objective of the institution is to transform the students into well meaning citizens through the committed pattern of instructions based on carefully prepared and well designed curricular aspects. The changing needs of the time are the basis while building a rich corpus of talent. Hence, the main objective of our college is to transform the students good citizens through well prepared faculties and staff members. Sudhiranjan Lahiri Mahavidyalaya aspires to have a transformational impact on students through comprehensive education by inculcating qualities of competence, confidence and excellence. To achieve that goal it is necessary to ensure up to date renovation of all of our academic as well as administrative activities.

Nowadays civilization is going on too fast riding on technology. Information is available by a click of mouse. So we also have to go parallel with global development of technology. Everybody is responsible for optimal utilization of technology to serve the society better. But it is recognized fact that sufficient power back up is the necessary precondition to ensure that goal. That is why we have installed separate electrical transformer at the aegis of the fund provided under Rasthriya Uchatara Siksha Abhiyan (RUSA).

Sudhirnajan Lahiri Mahavidyalaya has become a pioneer institution in the state of West Bengal within a few couple of years from its inception in terms of teaching and learning, research and publication and co-curricular activities. Thus as a pioneer higher learning institution we can't deny the responsibility of ensuring adequate security of students, faculties, staff and also for all assets within the college campus. So, with a view to fulfilling the objective we installed CC Camera within the college campus at the aegis of fund provided under Rasthriya Uchatara Siksha Abhiyan (RUSA).

3. The Context:

In the era of globalization the entire world has become a global village. As an important part of society we cannot avoid that trend prevailing throughout the World. Considering these realities use of modern technologies and equipments within the college campus for running academic as well as administrative activities is the need of the hour. At the same time it is also fact use of modern technologies and equipments within the campus may be jeopardized in the absence of sufficient and constant power back up. To avoid that crucial problem we have installed separate electrical transformer.

Again with passage of time use of campus area of the college has been enlarged according tremendous increase of number of students. As a result ensuring securities of students, faculties, staff and ever increasing volume of assets within the campus area are not possible without the help of any modern security measures. In order to avoid that crucial problem we have installed CC Camera within the college campus.

4. The Practice

Time has come for us to adopt its modern technology-enabled equipments in all sorts of activities of the institution. But use of prevailing system of power supply it was hardly possible to ensure optimum utilization of those equipments. Thus by installation of separate electrical transformer for the institution we did away the problem poor power supply and ensured optimum utilization of our available resources.

Again with the increase of number of students, volume of physical resources it is not possible for ever growing higher learning institution ensure adequate securities within campus without the use of modern technologies. So, by installation CC Camera we did away that problem within the campus.

5. Evidence of Success:

The college is located at an economically and socially backward area. In spite of that fact it is committed to impart quality higher education to its students. In order to shoulder that responsibility it is use lot of modern technologies and equipments within the campus. But use those technologies and equipments call for sufficient and constant power back up. The standing power supply of the institution was failed to ensure the same. Thus by installation of separate electrical transformer for the College it has been proved to be successful to overcome that problem.

Again it is not possible to ensure adequate securities within vast campus area without using modern technology enabled equipment. By installation of CC Camera we have ensured easiest solution of that problem.

6. Problems encountered and Resources Required:

The internal electrical installations of the College have been become obsolete and back dated. As a result, we are yet to full potentials of constant and sufficient power back up. We have also chalked out specific plan of action to overcome the problem.

Scarcity of adequate skilled staff, who are habituated with modern technology is a standing problem of the institution. With the help of very limited skilled staff we are striving for ensuring adequate securities within campus with the use of CC Camera.

Major resources for two important activities have been financed by the Ministry of Human Resource Development, Government of India.
