Programme Outcomes (POs)

****PO1: Understanding Classical and Contemporary Philosophy****

- Students will be acquainted with classical thoughts and contemporary philosophical queries, enabling a deep understanding of various philosophical traditions and developments.

****PO2: Analytical Skills and Critical Thinking****

- Students will develop the ability to recognize, analyze, and respond to different types of philosophical questions, enhancing their analytical skills and critical thinking.

****PO3: Argumentation and Evaluation****

- Students will learn to present philosophical arguments accurately, provide appropriate grounds for evaluating arguments, and address potential counter-arguments and objections, fostering their argumentative and evaluative skills.

****PO4: Articulation of Personal Views****

- The program will enable students to articulate their own point of view in a clear, consistent, concise, and thorough manner, improving their communication and self-expression skills.

****PO5: Examination of Fundamental Concepts****

- Students will engage in a systematic and sustained examination of the basic concepts important to human existence, such as justice, knowledge, goodness, the self, meaning, thought, and action, broadening their intellectual horizons.

****PO6: Historical Perspective and Tolerance****

- Students will acquire a historical perspective on the diversity of human thoughts and develop tolerance for the alternative opinions of others, enhancing their cultural awareness and open-mindedness.

****PO7: Autonomy in Decision Making****

- The program will foster students' development of autonomy in their decision-making processes, encouraging independence and self-reliance.

****PO8: Awareness of Philosophy's Value and Limits****

- Students will gain an understanding of the value and limits of philosophy, developing a reflective attitude and sensitivity to the subtleties and complexities of philosophical judgments.

- The syllabus includes content relevant to Civil Services Examinations (State and Central) and other competitive examinations, preparing students for UPSC, PSC, SSC, and other competitive careers. Additionally, students are equipped to pursue research or careers in any area of philosophy and allied fields.

Programme Specific Outcomes (PSOs)

This foundation will enable them to engage in research that delves into the basic nature of reality.

****PSO3: Proficiency in Western Logic****

- Students will acquire skills in identifying valid arguments using logical rules, understanding Mill's experimental methods, the formulation of scientific hypotheses, and various theories of argument. They will also learn existential import, symbolic interpretation, constructing formal proofs of validity, and applying quantification theory and set theory. This knowledge prepares them for logic-based competitive examinations by enhancing their rational aptitude and mathematical application skills.

****PSO4: Mastery of Indian Logic****

- Through the study of Indian Logic, students will refine their systematic logical reasoning and argumentation techniques, contributing to a broader understanding and appreciation of logic's diverse traditions.

****PSO5: Ethical Awareness and Responsibility****

- Students will develop an awareness of ethical theories and their application to real-world situations. This outcome emphasizes the importance of becoming enlightened citizens with a strong commitment to societal responsibilities and values, opening avenues for research in applied ethics.

- The study of the philosophy of religion will offer students a critical lens through which to understand human existence within its broader cultural context, examining the interplay between religion and various social, economic, political, and institutional factors, as well as religion's impact on history, geography, and literature.

- Students will engage in the critical analysis of social and political issues, fostering an understanding of the complex interactions between society, politics, and philosophical thought. This analysis will enhance their ability to critically evaluate contemporary social and political debates.

- Through the study of psychology within the philosophical context, students will learn to apply scientific reasoning to analyze psychological issues and engage in basic psychological research. This prepares them for further study and careers where understanding of psychological principles is essential.
