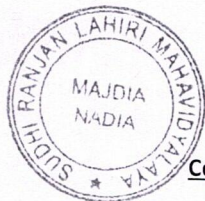

Course Title : MOHANDAS KARAMCHAND GANDHI: THOUGHTS AND RELEVANCE.

Course Aim

This course aims to provide the students with an insight into the life and philosophy of Mahatma Gandhi. The knowledge acquired by them would be utilized towards practical ends. It would enable them to pursue higher studies on diverse aspects of Gandhiji, a reformer and a philosopher. It would help the students to apply the tools of Gandhian Philosophy in the area of human resources management and practices in the present global context.

Course Objective

The basic objective of this course is to facilitate students to participate enthusiastically in all aspects of peace studies, peace-building in conflict and post-conflict societies. It will help them in the understanding of Gandhian approach to peace and non-violence from the interdisciplinary perspective and comprehend Gandhi's ideals and perceptions on political, socio-economic, environmental and developmental issues. The course provides opportunities to the learners for higher studies in the area of theoretical and applied Gandhian Studies, Peace, Conflict Management, Social Regeneration focusing on women upliftment and rural regeneration.

The syllabus will explore Gandhi, the man behind the legend, as well as his philosophy of ahimsa, (*non-violence*). Mahatma Gandhi and his principles have great relevance in this era of Globalization. The course aims at training the students in the art of participatory management and peaceful methods of conflict resolution.
