




<u>Sanctioned Student Strength per yr. versus No. of students admitted</u> (1st+2nd+3rd Yr):

a. Executive Summary

1. Introduction

Sudhiranjan Lahiri Mahavidyalaya grew out of dream of a dedicated social worker and freedom fighter, Sudhiranjan Lahiri, who devoted all his tangible and intangible resources to the cause of higher education for the young in the locality. Of late, this institution has transformed into an ever-growing centre in pursuit of excellence in higher education for the students far beyond its conventional hinterland. Excellence through Dedication is the mantra unceasingly enkindles the teaching faculty and the in house staff to perform their responsibilities for the benefit of the students. As this institution is located in the periphery with all its social and economic peripheral attributes, it usually imposes no choice in respect of admission. However, the peripheral students come out with marketable potentiality and higher human values in them.

The college started with affiliation to the University of Calcutta for pre-University and undergraduate course in 1966. Only 27 students in total enrolled themselves to the said courses. In 1973, the college earned affiliation for Bengali Honours standard and in 1974 Pass/General standard in Commerce was introduced. It was under the able leadership of late principal Dr. Hirendra Chandra Ghosh that the college really began to take off. This institution is perhaps the only instance in the rural border area of West Bengal that is affiliated in so many subjects with Honours standard in Bengali, Accountancy, History, Political Science, Philosophy, Sociology, English and Geography along with pass standard to Economics, Defense Studies and Physical Education. By this time the student strength has crossed the 1500 mark. From April, 1999 the University of Kalyani became the affiliating university for this college under the decision of the West Bengal State Legislature along with all other colleges in the districts of Nadia and Murshidabad. Following the Kalyani University pattern, the academic session of the college is annual, beginning July each year.

The geographical location of the college is in the Krishnaganj Block in the district of Nadia. It is about 1.5 kilometers from the Majdia Station on the Sealdah- Gede Section of the Eastern Railway. **Sudhiranjan Lahiri Mahavidyalaya** is approachable through 34 National High Way which passes through Krishnanagar, district headquarters of Nadia and is just 27 kilometers from Majdia.

2. Purpose of the Report

Purpose of This Assessment and Accreditation

The purpose of the present exercise in assessment and accreditation by *National Assessment and Accreditation Council* (NAAC) is twofold: **Firstly,** it is to expose and subject ourselves willingly to evaluation by an external agency that is professionally proficient and competent for the job. **Secondly,** we use this as an opportunity to self-introspect. Our own thinking thereby gets clarified in terms of our goal to be achieved, the path to be followed for this achievement and the realization of our goal by bridging the gap between where we ultimately need to go and where we presently are.

This report is based on the data collected under the Format for Self-study forwarded by NAAC, Bangalore.

3. Profile of the College

Goals and Objectives of the Institution

The goals and objectives of the institution, can be given as under:

- 2. To offer ideal collegiate education to both boys and girls irrespective of caste, colour and creed under the syllabus of the University of Kalyani.
- 3. To simultaneously develop the body and minds of the students
- 4. To usher and inculcate new sets of values through continuous counselling.
- 5. To foster diverse extra curricular activities by and for the students.

- 6. To orient the students into research oriented inter-disciplinary knowledge.
- 7. To instill democratic values and to motivate the students to perform constitutional duties, and
- 8. To constitute social and disciplined life together with others in society.

Some Statistics Regarding Sudhiranjan Lahiri Mahavidyalaya

Our annual intake is 945 students. The college campus has two double storied buildings and two single storied Staff Quarters. The main building houses most of the Arts and Commerce departments as well as administrative offices and College library and class rooms. The other building houses Geography Department including the laboratory, Offices of the NCC and NSS and College Computer Centre.

The total faculty strength of Mahavidyalaya is 20. The actual number, however, is 17 on account of 3 vacancies. We also have some part-time teachers and Guest teachers. From time to time, we procure some eminent guest lecturers from universities and reputed institutions. The number of non-teaching staff including one librarian is 8. In addition we have 5 casual workers on daily wages.

Administrative Setup

The college being a government aided and affiliated to the University of Kalyani, its administration is guided by the rules and regulations of the Government of West Bengal and the university statute.

The college **Governing Body** which is constituted every four years as per the University Statute is the apex administrative Body of the college. Principal of the college is ex-officio secretary of the Governing Body and only permanent member of the Governing Body. Two members are nominated by the Executive Council of the University; one member is nominated by the state government who is an educationist. The chairman of the Panchayat Samity is also an ex-officer member. Teachers' Council elects four members and whole time non-teaching employees elect two members on the governing body. The general secretary of the student union is an ex official member. The president of the governing body is elected by the governing body in its first meeting either amongst such member referred above or from outside.

As per the statute, the president must be an academician of repute or a distinguished professional or a senior administrative officer.

The **Teachers' Council** of the college is a statutory body meant to advise the principal on academic matters. All the whole time teachers are members of the council. The council appoints several subcommittees every year to assist the administration in the various activities like preparation of class routine, library administration, conduct of examinations, helping in research project proposals, publication of annual magazine, monitoring the sports activities, etc. The library department is headed by the librarian who administers it, with the assistance of library subcommittee of the Teachers' Council.

There is an association of students called *Sudhranjan LahiriMahavidyalaya Chatra Samsad* (Students' Union) whose different subcommittees assist the administration in conducting various students' activities, both curricular and co-curricular.

Academic Aspects

Our institution being an affiliated college under Kalyani University, the syllabi and curricula are decided by the University. Our freedom consists only in implementing the given course syllabus and to prepare the students for the university examinations held at the end of the year. However, senior teachers of some departments are members of university boards of studies in their respective subjects and therefore they have a say in the syllabus framing, determination of questions setters and evaluators, etc. Most of our teachers are question setters and examiners of Kalyani University. Apart from deciding the syllabi and curricula, the University also conducts examinations for which the framing of questions, evaluation of scripts, publication of consolidated results, etc. are done centrally by the University for all its affiliated institutions. The degrees in various courses are also awarded by the University. It is also the prerogative of the University to monitor the academic standards of the colleges affiliated to it by calling for periodic reports and by physical inspection.

University of Kalyani, as a matter of general policy, does not allow affiliated colleges to teach postgraduate courses. One exception to this is Krishnanagar Government College, Krishnanagar in the district of Nadia. The University departments themselves teach postgraduate courses in their campuses.

The University, as fallout of the above policy, does not normally encourage teachers to guide students for research. Teachers of the undergraduate colleges need to apply to the University for Special Permission to guide research students, which is usually hard to get.

This is the primary reason for the college not being able to start postgraduate teaching or research activity despite having qualified, research-oriented faculty. That is why; most of our teachers in active research are compelled to go to other universities like University of Calcutta, University of Burdwan, Rabindra Bharati University, etc., for pursuing their research.

Annual Academic Calendar

Our academic session begins in July and ends in June every year. The session is roughly divided into three terms: July to September, October to January, and February to June. University Examinations are held at the end of each year. There is one major vacation for about a month at the time of *Durga Puja* festival during September or October. There are two recesses, one during summer and another during winter. During the recesses only the classes are suspended while all the other activities of the college including University Examinations take place. Summer recess is from 16 May to 30 June, while winter recess is from 25 December to 1 January.

Annual Cultural and Sports Programmes

Sudhiranjan Lahiri Mahavidyalaya has a rich tradition of cultural life. Cultural functions and competitions round the year mark the students' life in College. Besides the Annual cultural fest **Spandan**, where competitions are held in extempore speech, elocution, recitation, debate, theme Development and vocal music, creative writing in annual magazine as well as wall magazines are also promoted. The college organizes seminars for students as well as for teachers on various contemporary topics of

rinterest. The annual prize distribution ceremony is held during September every year. Principal reads out a comprehensive report of the activities of the Institution during the year. Copies of this report are circulated to all the staff members and guests. **The annual sports** event of the college is held in month of February. On this occasion prizes are awarded not only for the athletics and sports events held on that day but also for the various games played throughout the year.

Students' Daily and Weekly Routine

Mahavidyalaya students are required to follow the class routine as well as the academic calendar The classes in the college begin at 11 am and go upto 4:15 pm. NCC parade and NSS training are held regularly in college campus.

Conclusion:

The college has by now earned some reputation both in the academic map of West Bengal and in extra-curricular activities. For years together, the good number of students of this college has proved to be among the best students of the university. It is our pride to announce that many of our students have now been teachers in schools and colleges and many of them found their positions in different government, semi government and other non-government organisation. A number of students of this college have found way into the sports' world too. Many a time our students have been the state representatives in NSS, NCC and other spheres of extra-curricular activities. The college attempts to reach beyond the privileged few that get a chance to be students of this institution. In this pursuit we have opened up a study centre of Netaji Subhas Open University (NSOU) where many a drop out as well as the employed gets a scope to enhance their knowledge. Our NSOU Centre may boast of some Olympians and other international level athletes, probably the only means of continuing their study.

Our institution feels that a vocational orientation is a must in today's world. We therefore run a computer centre in partnership with the 'Brainmirror' and approved by Government of West Bengal, where our students may learn the basics of computers related courses.

One area in which our college has outperformed its peers is in the field of sports. We have been champions in different district level and University level meets for the last few years. Our athletes have also earned laurels for the college by their performance at various state levels and National level meets.

1.1 Curriculum Design and Development

1.1.1 State the vision and mission of the institution, and how it is communicated to the students, teachers, staff and other stake holders?

The activities and future plans of Sudhiranjan Lahiri Mahavidyalaya are guided by its Vision and Mission which are reflected in its motto, 'Excellence through Dedication'.

The vision of Sudhiranjan Lahiri Mahavidyalaya is to impart quality education by focusing on value addition with conventional education, by emphasizing social values, environmental awareness and extra curricular activities and make self sufficient and socially responsible citizen and thereby become a premier institution in the region.

The following mission statements aim at translating **Sudhiranjan Lahiri Mahavidyalaya's** vision into action plans:

- ➤ To offer ideal collegiate education to both boys and girls irrespective of caste, colour and creed under the syllabus of the University of Kalyani in the backward rural area.
- To simultaneously develop the body and minds of the students.
- > To usher and inculcate new sets of values through continuous counselling.
- ➤ To foster diverse extra curricular activities by and for the students.
- > To orient the students into research oriented inter-disciplinary knowledge.

- > To instil democratic values and to motivate the students to perform constitutional duties.
- > To spread education in the neighborhoods through various extension programmes organized by NCC and NSS units.
- > To generate computer awareness and computer literacy of the students, the teachers and the non-teaching members of the office staff.

Sudhiranjan Lahiri Mahavidyalaya is designed to actualize the institution's educational vision. The society demands that education should be man-making and character building, meaning thereby that the students should develop their character in the light of the knowledge they acquire through education, whose purpose is not merely to produce knowledgeable and skillful human beings, but to produce men and women of impeccable integrity.

The mission statements of the Institution has been framed with due consideration to the Institution's distinctive characteristics, particularly meeting the needs of the society, requirements of the students as well as institution's tradition and value orientation. Its geographical location has imposed a heavy burden upon the institution to take a positive role in generating sound, dedicated, devoted, committed human resources so as to improving economic condition of the locality. Thus our mission statements reflect needs and requirements of the backward region where the institution is situated.

1.1.3 Are the academic programmes in line with the institution's goals and objectives? If yes, give details on how the curricula developed/ adopted, address the needs of the society and have relevance to the regional/ national and global trends and developmental needs? (access to the Disadvantaged, Equity, Self development, Community and National Development, Ecology and environment, Value orientation, Employment, ICT introduction, Global and National demands and so on)

The basic objective of establishing of this Institution was to improve sociocultural and economic condition of the economically backward and border area. Thus different academic programmes, which have been so far adopted by this Institution, are selected with due consideration to the aforesaid matter. Although different academic programmes are selected by the college authority after consultation with other relevant bodies e.g. Academic Council, Teachers' council, but its final decision is taken after having necessary approval from the affiliating University and curriculum required for this purpose is set by appropriate bodies of the affiliating University. Our institution being an affiliated college under Kalyani University, the syllabi and curricula are decided by the University. Our freedom consists only in implementing the given course syllabus and to prepare the students for the university examinations held at the end of the year. However, senior teachers of some departments are members of University Boards of Studies in their respective subjects and therefore they have a say in the syllabus framing, determination of questions setters and evaluators, etc. Most of our teachers are question setters and examiners of Kalyani University.

Apart from deciding the syllabi and curricula, the University also conducts examinations for which the framing of questions, evaluation of scripts, publication of consolidated results, etc. are done centrally by the University for all the colleges affiliated to it. The degrees in various courses are also awarded by the University. It is also the prerogative of the University to monitor the academic standards of the colleges affiliated to it by calling for periodic reports and by physical inspection.

The University of Kalyani offers Honours courses at the degree level like other universities in West Bengal apart from the three year general courses. Only the Honours course students are eligible for admission into post graduate courses in the respective honours subject. Mahavidyalaya offers Honours as well as General courses of study. The structures of the Honours as well as the General courses are such that at the end of each year a student has to take University examination. Thus, at the end of the first year study Part I Examination is held. Thereafter, at the end of second year and third year of study, Part II and Part III examinations are held respectively. The University conducts the Part I, Part II and Part III Examinations.

The syllabi and curricula are periodically assessed and modified by the University in keeping with the development at the national and international level. Sometimes, UGC sends model curricula which are seriously considered. During last five years syllabi of different subjects have been revised twice. The 'Environmental Studies' has become compulsory at the undergraduate level. Application of computer has also been introduced in some subjects like Accountancy.

1.1.4 How does the curriculum cater to inclusion/integration of information and Communication Technology (ICT) in the curriculum, for equipping the students to compete in the global employment markets?

In fact, there is no scope before our Institution to design curriculum necessary for conducting different academic programmes adopted by it. It is the affiliating University, which set and designs the curriculum. Very recently, the University has introduced a paper namely 'Practical Computer Accounting & Taxation' in B.Com. (Honours & General) Programme in order to equipping the students to compete in the global employment markets.

Our institution feels that vocational orientation is a must in today's world. We therefore run a computer centre in partnership with 'Brainmirror' and approved by ETDC, Government of West Bengal, where our students may learn the basics of computer related courses. We have also planned to introduce 'Communicative English Course' for the students and staff but unfortunately, due to lack of required number of faculty members, this could not be materialized.

1.1.5 Specify the initiatives and contributions of the institution in the curriculum design and development process. (Need assessment, development of information database, feedback from faculty, students, alumni, employees and academic peers, and communicating the information and feedback for appropriate inclusion and decisions in statutory academic bodies, Membership of BOS and by sending agenda items, etc.)

As per the norms of the institution, it has no authority to design the curriculum. It is only to follow the curriculum designed and developed from time to time by its affiliating University. The affiliating University designs and takes decision upon the curriculum on the basis of recommendation of its board of studies, which is constituted with the representatives of its different affiliated colleges, University experts as well as with experts from other institutions. As such four teachers of our college are the members of the board of studies at the University of Kalyani.

Further, conceptualizing of new programmes leading to degrees is the prerogative of the university. But the college can introduce a new programme that is

already part of the existing programmes of the university or those that the university brings up to keep in tune with the times. For introducing a new programme the college has to first apply to West Bengal Higher Education Council and with their recommendation, to the university. The university then sends an inspection team to assess the physical and academic infrastructure of the college. On the basis of the report of the inspection team the university grants permission for the introduction of the new programme applied for, subject to review after a certain stipulated period. Once any new programme is introduced by the university and the institution decides to offer that it takes as little time as six months. Recently, we introduced Geography Honours Course.

1.2.1 What are the range of programme options available to learners in terms of Degrees, Certificates and Diplomas?

The college started with affiliation to the University of Calcutta for pre-university and under graduate course in 1966. This institution is perhaps the only instance in the rural border area of West Bengal that is affiliated to so many subjects with Honours standard as stated below and Pass/ General standard to Economics, Defence Studies, Physical Education & Accountancy. From April, 1999 the University of Kalyani became the affiliating university for this college under the decision of the West Bengal State Legislature along with all other colleges in the districts of Nadia and Murshidabad.

The details on the provisions with reference to academic flexibility, value addition and course enrichment are given below:

- a) Core options: Three subjects of 50 marks each namely Environmental Studies, Bengali as Modern Indian language and Compulsory English are the core subjects to be taken by all students of the Institution irrespective of their discipline / programme.
- b) Elective options: Students of B.A. (Honours) Programme can select any one subject from the seven available subjects viz., Bengali, History, Political Science, Philosophy, Sociology, Geography and English as their Honours subject and they have also options to choose any two subjects from a pool of nine subjects, namely, Bengali, History, Political Science, Philosophy,

Sociology, English, Defense Studies, Physical Education and Economics, provided that no student can opt for a general subject which he / she has opted as Honours subject. Students of B.A. (General) programme can opt for any three subjects from the above said general subjects. Students of B.Sc. (General) course may choose from any four subject-combinations namely, (i) Bengali, Physical Education and Defense Studies; (ii) Political Science, Physical Education and Defense Studies; (iii) Bengali, Economics and Defense Studies (iv) Political Science, Economics and Defense Studies. Similarly, Students of B. Com. Honours and B. Com. General programmes may choose from alternative group of subjects.

- c) Add on courses: The College offers certificate course on Computer awareness and has planned to introduce a certificate course on communicative English from the next session.
- d) **Interdisciplinary courses**: Only two interdisciplinary courses namely, B.Com. (Honours) in Accountancy & Finance and B.Com. (General) courses are taught in this Institution. In case of B.Com.(Honours) course, students are to take eight subjects, namely, Accounting Theory & Financial Accounting, Cost Accounting, Tax Practice & Procedure (Direct or Indirect), Business Economics, Corporate Accounting, Auditing & Financial Management, Advanced Business Mathematics & Statistics and Business Management. In case of B.Com. (General) course, the students are to take twelve papers namely Economic Theory & Business Environment, Indian Financial System & Market Operations, Business & Company Laws, Business Mathematics & Statistics, Business Communication & Entrepreneurship Development, Practical Computer Accounting & Taxation, Accounting theory & Accountancy, Cost Accounting, Taxation(Direct & Indirect), Advanced Accounting, Auditing & Management Accounting, Elements of Management. The students of B. Com. (Honours) course are also to take the first six papers.
- e) Flexibility to the students to move from one discipline to another:

The students may shift from one discipline to another discipline and from one programme to another programme and even from one group of subjects to another before their registration with the University i.e. within three months

after admission, provided that no student without having Economics, Mathematics or Statistics or Accountancy or related subject in Higher Secondary can shift to B.Com.(Hons.) course or B.Com.(Gen.) course. This provision enables student's greater horizontal mobility with a large number of programme options in diverse disciplines.

f) Flexibility to pursue the programme with reference to the time frame: (flexible time for completion)

All the programmes for University degree offered in this Institution are of three year duration. However, there exists flexibility to pursue the programme. A student may be allowed to take almost six years to complete a degree level programme subject to certain conditions.

12.3 Give details of the programmes and other facilities available for international Students (if any)

All the programmes and facilities offered by this institution are also available for international students. However, University fee structures are different for the international students. Currently we do not have any international students.

1.2.4 Does the institution offer any self-financed programmes in the institution? If yes, list them and indicate how they differ from other programmes, with reference to admission, curriculum, fee structure, teacher qualification and salary etc.

We don't have any self-financed programme per se. However, we have introduced three programmes which are partially self-financed or, it may be said that they are offered at enhanced fee. These courses are: (i) English (Honours), (ii) Geography (Honours) and (iii) Physical Education (General). These courses only differ from other courses in respect of fee structure. Additional faculty development fees taken from the students are as follows:

English (Hons.) course Rs 175 /- per month,

Geography (Hons.) course : Rs 350 /- per month,

Physical Education (Gen.) course Rs 125 /- per month,

1.3 Feedback on Curriculum

- 1.3.1. How does the college obtain feedback on curriculum from
 - (a) Students? (b) alumni? (c) Parents? (d) employers / industries? (e) academic peers? (f) community?
- a) **Students**: Students may give their feedback on curriculum in the following ways:
- i) They may give their feedback in the meeting of Teacher-Student Committee.
 - ii) They may give their feedback in the Grievance Cell.
 - iii) They have one representative in College Governing Body through which they may give there views.
 - iv) Students may also give their feedback to their respective subject teachers.
- b) Alumni: College has one Alumni Association namely Sudhiranjan Lahiri Mahavidyalaya Alumni & Welfare Association, meeting of which are held from time to time. The members of Alumni Association may give their opinion in that meeting.
- c) Parents: Parents give their opinion in the Parent-Teacher meetings. However, since the college is situated in the backward rural area and most of the parents do not have formal idea about the procedure of curriculum framing, they hardly talk on the issue.
- d) **Employers / industries**: We do not have provisions for obtaining feedback.
- e) Academic peers: Feedback from academic peers is obtained in the meetings of academic council and also from different seminars / workshops that are routinely organized for the task at hand. Last year, we organized one such workshop on 'Syllabi of History'. Our teachers also attend similar programmes that are held in other institutions and pass on their experiences/ understanding to others in the departmental committee meetings.
- f) **Community**: There is no formal provision for obtaining feedback.

1.3.2. How are the above feedback analyzed and the outcome / suggestions used for continuous improvements, and communicated to the affiliating university for appropriate inclusion?

The above feedback is analyzed in the meeting of Academic Council/ Teachers' Council of the college and the outcome / suggestions are communicated to the University through the teachers of the college who are the members of the Board of Studies of the University. The feedback obtained in Workshop is sent to the University and also to the UGC in the form of report. These reports are then considered by the respective Board of Studies while upgrading the curriculum. We have our teachers in the UG Board of Studies for Economics, Sociology, Environmental Studies and Accountancy.

1.4 Curriculum update

What are the frequency and the basis for syllabus revision and what are the major revisions made during the last two years?

Since all matters concerning the syllabus are decided by the affiliating university, the institution has only a small role in the revision or updating of the curricula, except when some of our faculty members serve on the various boards of studies and expert committees set up by the university's Undergraduate Council of Studies. There is no fixed frequency of syllabus revision, but the development of new trends and new concepts in particular subject is the basis for the syllabus revision. There were no major revisions made during the last two years except distributing the Papers within every Programme in the new 1+1+1 format with yearly University examinations.

1.4.2 How does the institution ensure that the curriculum bears a thrust on core *values adopted by NAAC?*

Since University is the sole authority to revise the curriculum, the institution has only a small role as has been stated earlier. However, since the core values adopted by NAAC, the affiliating University and this institution are not widely different, realizing the mission statements of the institution would ensure that the curriculum bears a thrust on core values adopted by NAAC

1.4.3 Does the institution use the guidelines of statutory bodies (UGC/ AICTE / State Councils of HE and other bodies) for developing and/or restructuring the curricula?

The affiliating university, as a matter of policy adhere to the suggestions made by the statutory bodies like the UGC and the State Council of Higher Education for developing and/restructuring the curricula. Thus by following the curricula of the affiliating University, the institution indirectly uses the guidelines of the statutory bodies mentioned above.

1.4.4 How are the existing courses modified to meet the emerging/ changing national and global trends?

The basis for the modification or restructuring of the existing courses, as has been stated earlier, is to meet the emerging/changing national and global trends. Thus, in last few years, the environmental Studies has been introduced as core option and Practical Computer Accounting & Taxation has been introduced in B. Com. (Honours) and B. Com. (General) with this end in view.

1.5 Best Practices in Curricular Aspects

- What are the quality sustenance and quality enhancement measures 1.5.1 undertaken by the institution during the last five years in curricular aspects?
 - During the last five years all the subject departments have started publishing Wall Magazines on a regular basis.
 - Arrangement of seminar and workshop where students can mingle with and interact with resource persons of other institutions.
 - Arrangement of special lectures by invited teachers.
 - ➤ Introduction of new programmes: Geography in Honours standard, Physical Education as General subject and also certificate course in Computer Awareness.

1.5.2 What best practices in 'Curricular Aspects' have been planned/implemented by the institution?

The best practices in 'Curricular Aspects' have been planned/ implemented by the institution are:

- > Providing tutorial classes in the class-routine especially for the weaker section of the students.
- > Encouraging better students by giving prizes for their performances in the class-tests and periodical examinations.
- > Providing books & financial assistances etc. to the financially weaker section of the students.
- Assessment of teachers and the institution by the students.
- Arrangement of lectures by the ex-students.
- ➤ We plan to provide study guide to the students from the next session.

Criterion II: Teaching – Learning and Evaluation

2.1 Admission Process and Student Profile.

2.1.1 How does the institution ensure wide publicity to the admission process?

The institution ensures wide publicity to the admission process by selling Prospectus to the intending public, through Institutional Website and by advertisement in the regional Cable Network. This apart, the vernacular dailies on their own publishes details about Programmes offered and admission process, etc. for all institutions of a particular region in the pages earmarked for the region.

- 2.1.2 How are the students selected for admission to the following courses? Give the cut off percentage for admission at the entry level
 - a) General
 - b) Professional
 - c) Vocational

As this institution is located in the periphery with all its social and economic peripheral attributes, it usually imposes no choice in respect of admission of students to various programmes available. However, once admitted, peripheral students come out with marketable potentiality and higher humane values in them. Students are admitted on the basis of merit panel prepared by the college admission committee and open counseling. The cut off percentage for admission to the following courses are given below:

2.1.3 How does the Institution ensure transparency in the Admission process?

Sudhiranjan Lahiri Mahavidyalaya has a transparent admission process and every effort is made to see that absolute transparency is ensured in the admission process. The application forms for admission are distributed to aspiring candidates depending upon the cut off marks in public examinations at the higher secondary level, for which a detailed notice spelling out the norms and procedures of admission is issued in advance. A preliminary merit list of eligible candidates, prepared on the basis of a formula decided at a meeting of the Admission Committee consisting of all the Heads of the Departments and the Principal of the college is put up on the notice board, clearly displaying the formula used to prepare the list. There after Open Counseling is held and the students are invited to get admitted on or before a cutoff date.

- 2.1.4 How do you promote access to ensure equity?
 - a) Students from disadvantaged community
 - b) Women
 - c) Differently-abled

The statutory reservation policy of the government is followed to ensure equity in the admission for the pupil from disadvantaged community. This college is co-educational and as such no positive discrimination is made favouring female candidates vis-à-vis male candidates in the matter of admission or any other matters. Some seats are kept reserved for physically challenged and 5% relaxation in marks is also allowed. No special provision is in existence for economically weaker section in the matter of admission. However, they are provided with some economic benefit viz. fee waivers / free studentship etc. Some seats are kept reserved in B.A. & B.Com. General courses for sports personnel. They are also provided with monetary benefits if they come from economically weaker sections.

2.2 Catering to Diverse Needs

2.2.1 Is there a provision for assessing the students' knowledge and skills before the commencement of the programme? If yes, give details on the strategies of the institution to bridge the knowledge gap of the incoming students for enabling them to cope with the programme to which they are enrolled.

Sudhiranjan Lahiri Mahavidyalaya tries to offer programmes of teaching and learning which cater to individual differences among learners. It also tries to ensure some academic flexibility, within the framework of the given curricula and syllabi of the University of Kalyani. At the beginning of each course, the knowledge and skills of admitted students are assessed through an interaction between students and teachers of the departments concerned. Depending on the assessment, necessary modifications in the teaching procedures are made. Different Departments adopt different methods to provide remedial/bridge courses. Some examples are stated below (for details please refer to the departmental inputs).

Department of English

Since most of the students come from Bengali medium with less exposure to English, their English language skills are usually quite below the mark considering the vastness of the English Honours syllabus. With this constraint of students in view, the department sets apart three months initially for improvement of language skills through making them write on various literary topics, error analysis, remedial teaching, etc. Rather than begin teaching the course straight away. The students are also encouraged to participate in interactive sessions, group discussions, etc.

Department of Bengali

Being their mother tongue, most of the students entering the Bengali honours course suffer from two major deficiencies (i) lack of adequate knowledge of grammar, and (ii) confusion about the right spelling of the words, particularly because the spelling pattern which is in the process of standardization has kept on changing over the years. The department therefore sets apart the first few months to remedy the situation arising from above. One further aspect in this language honours course is the importance of a good legible, if not highly artistic, handwriting. The students are made to practice continuous writing to improve in all the above three aspects.

Departments of History, Political Science, Sociology and Philosophy

Except for the History Honours, the student input in these courses is relatively low and on top of it some of them have not studied these subjects at the higher secondary level. Therefore, efforts are made to orient the students to the subject and make them take lively interest in the course of their study through personal care and academic counseling.

2.2.2 How does the institution identify slow and advanced learners? Give details on the strategies adopted for facilitating slow and advanced learners

We identify slow and advanced learners right from the time of admission and later on by a continuous process of classroom interaction, examination evaluation and students' own eagerness for study outside the curricula. The strategies discussed in 2.2.1 are meant mainly for the slow learners. Further, there are always some students with advanced talents who need to be nurtured through a preferential treatment. The advanced students are guided to study advanced reference texts and journals. They are encouraged to prepare and deliver seminar lectures on some specialized topics through which they develop a deeper understanding of the subject. Various departments regularly organize extension lectures by eminent scholars from universities and institutes of higher learning. We bring about Wall Magazines regularly where advanced learners take the leadership. Thus, they gain writing skill, which extends beyond the prescribed syllabi, besides developing their creativity, innovation and originality.

2.2.3 Does the institution have a provision for tutorials for the students? If yes, give details.

Yes. Some classes are allotted for tutorials for the students of different departments.

2.2.4 Is there a provision for mentoring of students or any similar process? If yes, give details.

No, we do not have such provision.

How does the institution cater to the needs of differently- abled students?

We are yet to develop mechanism to cater to the needs of differentlyabled students.

2.3 Teaching -Learning Process

2.3.1 How does the institution plan and organize the teaching-learning and evaluation schedules? (Academic calendar, teaching plan and evaluation blue print, etc.)

This institution plans its teaching-learning and evaluation schedule before hand and they are communicated to the students through the **Annual Academic** Calendar.

Our academic session begins in July and ends in June every year. The session is roughly divided into three terms: July to September, October to January, and February to June. There is one major vacation for about a month at the time of *Durga* Puja festival during September or October. There are two recesses, one during summer and another during winter. During the recesses only the classes are suspended while all the other activities of the college including conduct of examinations take place. Summer recess is from 16 May to 30 June, while winter recess is from 25 December to 1 January.

Teaching plan: All the departments have term-specific teaching plans through which the students are informed at the very beginning the topics to be taught during the term. The plans are reviewed at the end of the term. The plans include a detailed schedule of tutorials, lessons, seminars, class tests, etc.

Evaluation schedules/ Evaluation blue print: This institution has a well conceived plan for monitoring student progress. The evaluation method in the college consists of class tests and term examinations. The schedules of term examinations are announced at the beginning of each term. Further, the details of the portion of the syllabus in which the students will be examined, distribution of the marks, weightage to be given to the class tests, etc. are also communicated to the students before hand by the respective departments.

Heads of the various departments monitor the progress of the schedule at regular intervals through periodical meetings of teachers with the students. The teachers redistribute, reassign or revise any topic, if it is called for.

As soon as the results of any mid-term or terminal examination are finalized, a meeting of the heads of all the departments is convened by the Principal/Convener of the Examination & Result Sub-committee. The results are discussed thoroughly and particularly those of weaker students discussed case by case. Remedial measures are decided upon; and the heads of departments with the help of their colleagues are entrusted with the responsibility of talking to the students individually to find out the causes of their poor performance and implementing the decision regarding remedial measures.

Regular department wise meetings are held between the teachers and the students regarding their performances in the various examinations. Recently most of the departments have initiated a novel system of open house discussion wherein the students frankly speak out their minds about the strengths and the weaknesses of the teaching-learning and evaluation processes in the department.

2.3.2 What are the various teaching-learning methods (lecture method, interactive method, project-based learning, computer-assisted learning, experiential learning, seminars and others) used by the teachers? Give details.

Mahavidyalaya facilitates the effective running of the teaching-learning programmes. To supplement the lecture method of teaching, the following learnercentered teaching methods are adopted: group discussions, quiz contests, student seminars, regular publication of wall magazines, academic tours and creative writing. The infrastructural facilities available for this purpose are Overhead Projector, LCD Projector, and presentation software, computer facility in the library and in computer room.

2.3.3 How learning is made student-centric? What are the institutional strategies, which contribute to acquisition of life skills, knowledge management skills and lifelong learning?

Teaching-learning is student centric when students participate actively through library work, seminar lectures, writing in magazines, etc. The courses that we offer are mainly knowledge based. However, every effort is made to make learning student-centric by encouraging teaching to be more interactive. The commerce stream students acquire the required skills during their computer practical class. We have also introduced seminars by our students. They are also encouraged to write in the Wall Magazines and also in Annual

Magazine. To make learning more interesting we are using sophisticated teaching aids like OHP, LCD projector, etc.

2.3.4 How does the institution ensure that the students have effective learning experiences? (Use of modern teaching aids and tools like computers, audiovisuals multi-media, ICT, CAL, Internet and other information /materials)

To make learning experiences more effective we have introduced modern teaching aids. Though the college is situated in a relatively backward border area, our students get to learn basic computer courses along with knowledge-based traditional programme concurrently. They can use computer in the library for searching books. OHP and audiovisual equipments are also used to give students a satisfying learning experience.

2.3.5 How do the students and faculty keep pace with the recent developments in the various subjects?

This institution subscribes different important academic journals through which both the students and faculty keep pace with recent academic developments in the various subjects. We arrange periodical seminars both at the regional and the national levels for exchange of ideas and update of knowledge. Teachers and students from other institutions (universities and colleges) are invited for these seminars. Departments also organize special lectures by eminent scholars with the same aim in view. Some of our teachers also have regular Internet access.

Our teachers also participate in various state-level, National level and also International seminars, which are held not only within the state but also in other states in India and even outside. Their academic exposure benefits students in the classroom situations. Apart from above, full time faculty members participate in Refresher Course and Orientation programmes, arranged by different Indian Universities.

2.3.6 Are there departmental libraries for the use of faculty and students? If yes, how effectively are they used for the enhancement of teaching and learning?

We have started departmental libraries very recently. We would need time to make its use effectively.

2.3.7 Has the institution introduced evaluation of the teachers by students? If yes, how is the feedback analyzed and implemented for the improvement of teaching?

Sudhiranjan Lahiri Mahavidyalaya has an open and participative mechanism for taking a feedback on the academic performance and work satisfaction of the faculty. This is done through continuous informal interaction with the head of the department concerned and the principal. This apart, the students give their written feed back before leaving the college on various aspects relating to the teaching-learning process including the faculty and infrastructure. These feedbacks are tabulated and analyzed and then it is included in the Annual Report. It is also discussed in the Teachers' Council meeting and appropriate steps are taken to reduce the shortcomings.

2.4 Teacher Quality

2.4.1 How are the members of the faculty selected? Does the college have the required number of qualified and competent teachers to handle all the courses? If not, how does the institution cope with the requirements?

Since only those teachers, who are recommended by West Bengal College Service Commission (WBCSC) in accordance with the State Government Act in this regard, are appointed the question of the college selecting members of the faculty on its own does not arise. However, the college management has had to appoint one teacher of Geography in the past, bearing the financial burden, for the department of Geography had been suffering from shortage of teachers.

Out of the 23 full-time sanctioned posts 5 teaching posts are lying vacant for different reasons. Mahavidyalaya tries to cope with the shortage of qualified staff by appointing qualified teachers on part-time basis as Guest/Part-time lecturers. At present we have 17 part-time lecturers. The college also organizes extension lectures and seminars by eminent scholars from other institutes and universities to reinforce the usual classroom teaching and to expose the students to some advanced topics.

2.4.2 How does the college appoint additional faculty to teach new programmes/ modern areas of study (Biotechnology, IT, Bioinformatics, etc.)? How many *such appointments were made during the last three years?*

After the university grants its permission to introduce a new programme, the college approaches to the Government for providing new faculty which normally is time consuming process. The College authority thus appoints Contractual/ Part-time/Guest faculty on the recommendation of the duly constituted Selection committee that includes one subject expert from the affiliating university. The UGC guidelines are generally followed for screening the candidates appearing before the selection committee.

During last three years only two new programmes viz. Geography (Honours) and Physical Education (General) have been introduced by the Institution. We had to appoint seven teachers and two part-time Physical Training Instructors for running the programmes. Those who were appointed are:

- i) Tamali Kar-Guest Lecturer in Geography
- ii) Soma Mitra- Guest Lecturer in Geography.
- iii) Juthika Das Bairagya- Guest Lecturer in Geography.
- iv) Paramita Sammadder- Guest Lecturer in Geography.
- v) Nilay Mishra- Guest Lecturer in Physical Education.
- vi) Ujjwal Mahapatra- Guest Lecturer in Physical Education.
- vii) Rejaul Islam- Guest Lecturer in Physical Education.
- viii) Asit Tarafder-Part-time Physical Training Instructor.
- ix) Sujay Biswas- Part-time Physical Training Instructor.
- 2.4.3 What efforts are made by the management for professional development of the faculty? (eg: research grants, study leave, deputation to national/ international conferences/ seminars, training programmes, organizing

national/international conferences etc)? How many faculty have availed these facilities during the last three years?

In S. R. Lahiri Mahavidyalaya, the faculty members have several opportunities for continued academic progress and professional advancement.

During the past few years we have initiated a programme for continuous faculty improvement called Internal Seminar Series attended by all our faculty members. These seminars are held in the seminar room. Our own teachers speak on the topics of their special interest and research. The uniqueness of the programme is that there is a compelling demand on the speaker to make the subject of his talk intelligible to a teacher belonging to an entirely different discipline. For example a person talking about some technical subject in Computer programming or Economics is required to make himself /herself intelligible to a Philosophy or History or Bengali teacher. These seminars have become very popular and there is a lively interaction among the faculty members belonging to various disciplines. We have collected write-ups from the various speakers and have published them after modification /revision as suggested by the peer reviewers in our research journal 'Open Eyes'.

Many of our teachers have enthusiastically taken up minor research projects (MRP) under the UGC scheme. These have tangibly contributed to faculty improvement. Recently, the college management has also sponsored one research project.

The management provides study leaves to the faculty members for national/international conferences/ attending seminars and training programmes. They are also encouraged to avail of financial benefits from the allocated fund of the UGC. Teachers are also encouraged to organize seminar/ conferences, etc. The management also encourages its faculty members to take up assignments in P. G. departments as guest faculty.

The institution organizes training programmes from time to time on the basis of the need. Some times, one or two advanced learner within the faculty acquires the required expertise himself/ themselves from out side for which study leaves are granted. They then pass on their knowledge to their interested colleagues. This is done mostly informally. Sri Saradindu De Sikdar, Lecturer in Mathematics, received training from the Indian Statistical Institute, Calcutta, on Computer Programming and Computeraided packages. Sri Kalidas Mukherjee, Lecturer in Commerce, Sri Amal

Kanta Das, Lecturer in Economics, Dr. A. K. Chattopadhyay, Lecturer in Economics and Sri Jayanta Chakraborty, Head Clerk, received training on Computer awareness & Internet from the University of Burdwan.

2.5 Evaluation Process and Reforms

The evaluation method in the college consists of class tests and term examinations. The schedule of term examinations with probable weeks and months are given in the college prospectus and the academic calendar supplied to the students at the time of admission. Further, the details of the portion of the syllabus in which the students will be examined, distribution of the marks, weightage to be given to the class tests, etc. are communicated to the students by the respective departments at the beginning of each term.

2.5.2 How does the institution monitor the progress of the students and communicate it to the students and their parents?

As has been said earlier, this institution has a well-conceived plan for monitoring student progress. The evaluation method in the college consists of class tests and term examinations. The schedules of term examinations are announced at the beginning of each term. Further, the details of the portion of the syllabus in which the students will be examined, distribution of the marks, weightage to be given to the class tests, etc. are also communicated to the students before hand by the respective departments.

As soon as the results of any mid-term or terminal examination are finalized, a meeting of the heads of all the departments is convened by the Principal/Convener of the Examination & Result Sub-committee. The results are discussed thoroughly and particularly those of weaker students discussed case by case. Remedial measures are decided upon; and the heads of departments with the help of their colleagues are entrusted with the responsibility of talking to the students individually to find out the causes of their poor performance and implementing the decision regarding remedial measures.

Regular department wise meetings are held between the teachers and the students regarding their performances in the various examinations. Recently most of the departments have initiated a novel system of open house discussion wherein the students frankly speak out their minds about the strengths and the weaknesses of the teaching-learning and evaluation processes in the department.

The students performing poorly in the various examinations are pulled up by the college administration by calling the Parents / guardians to the principal's office and discussing the causes as well as the remedial measures in the presence of the respective departmental heads. The involvement of the guardians in this regard proves extremely useful in boosting up the students' motivation and confidence.

An annual meeting of all the parents/guardians is called with all the teachers in the presence of the Principal to discuss the academic performances, discipline and the overall development of the students in the light of the Institution's ideology for which the college stands. The roles of the guardians are also sufficiently emphasized.

2.5.3 What is the mechanism for redressal of grievances regarding evaluation?

The mechanism for redressal of grievances regarding evaluation lies in showing the evaluation of the Answer scripts to the students and making the students understand the evaluation methods by discussing the answers-scripts with the students. At the university level, grievances regarding evaluation are addressed through established mechanism of (i) Post publication scrutiny of answer scripts and (ii) Re-evaluation of the answer scripts. However, for availing of such mechanism some preconditions are to be met by the candidate.

2.5.4 What are the major evaluation reforms initiated by the institution/affiliating University? How does the institution ensure effective implementation of these reforms?

The institution does not have the authority to undertake major evaluation reforms. However, from the academic year 2007-08, the affiliating University (the University of Kalyani) has made major revision in the evaluation pattern. Thus excepting for Compulsory English, Major Indian Language and Environmental Studies, 15 % of total marks have been kept for internal assessment. Therefore, the colleges will have direct role on the evaluation process of their students. This internal assessment will be based on class test, attendance, socio-cultural activities of the students and their class room behaviour.

To ensure effective implementation of this reform, the institution communicated the students about the university notification and the faculty members are taking class-tests and terminal examinations following this new pattern. Some of the faculty members have also participated in seminars organized by the affiliating University meant for proper communication of the changes.

The Seminar Sub-committee of Sudhiranjan Lahiri Mahavidyalaya is popularly known as the Seminar and Research Forum. It is one of the most important organs of the college. This Forum, though works within the administrative periphery of the college, is a well-known department in the entire district. It has been the centre for the development of inter-departmental exchanges and academic exercises for the teachers, students, research scholars of all categories, be they within the college or outside college including the research institutions.

The Seminar and Research Forum regularly conducts internal seminars as well as UGC sponsored State-level and National level seminars/conferences and workshops. It plays the role of coordinator for different subject departments in the college and also acts as facilitator in their endeavour to organise any research related work or seminars, etc. It also encourages faculty members to undertake various research related projects. During the last few years the teachers of this college has completed four UGC sponsored Minor Research Projects (MRP). Currently five UGC Minor Research Projects are being carried out by different teachers of this college. The college has also initiated one Research project on 'Changing Sex Ratio during the three year-period within the College Campus and it's Implications.' This project is funded by the college source. The Seminar and Research Forum regularly publishes a research Journal, 'Open Eyes'. It is a multi disciplinary peer reviewed journal of the Sudhiranjan Lahiri Lahiri Mahavidyalaya. It promotes scientific studies in Social Science, literature, Commerce and allied areas. The researchers and academicians throughout the state of West Bengal have started to patronize the journal, which is evident from the institutional affiliations of the contributors in the published volumes of the journal. The Advisory Board of the journal includes Md. Samsul Islam Molla (President, G.B.), Prof. Alok Kumar Banerjee (Dean, Faculty of Physical Education & former V.C., University of Kalyani), Dr. Ramakrishna Chattopadhyay (Asst. Secretary, Institute of Development Studies, Kolkata), Dr. S. K. Gandhi (Reader, Deptt. Of Commerce, K.U.), Dr. Sarojendra Nath Kar (Principal, SRLM), Sri Apurba Kumar Sar (HOD, Deptt of Bengali, SRLM, Sri Subhas Biswas (HOD, Deptt of Sociology) and Sri Kabiranjan Saha (HOD, Deptt. Of History). Dr Jaydeep Rishi, Convener, Seminar and Research Forum edits the journal. The Editorial Board includes Sri Amal Kanta Das (HOD, Deptt of Economics), Sri Kamal Pal (HOD, Deptt of Political Science), Dr. Md. Ahsan Ali (Senior Lecturer in Bengali), Sri Bhabesh M ajumdar (Lecturer in Bengali) and Ms. Soma Samanta (Lecturer in Philosophy).

The Forum also facilitated publication of one edited Volume, 'Globalisation and Problem of Unemployment in India', which was edited by Dr. Apurba Kumar Chattopadhyay, Convener, Seminar and Research Forum and Organising Secretary of the Seminar & financed by the UGC. It has also published a report on the workshop on 'Syllabi of History'. A souvenir-cum-Abstract has also been published recently on 'Sustainable Development and Role of Government'.

The Composition of the Seminar & Research Forum has been changed recently. Now, Sri Amal Kanta Das is the convener and all the Heads and Coordinators of the Departments are members of the Forum. The Principal Dr. S. N. Kar is the chairman.

3.1.2 How does the institution promote faculty participation in research? (providing seed money, research grants, leave, other facilities)

The institution promotes faculty participation in research by among other things, patronizing 'Seminar Research Forum'. The aim of the Forum is to promote scientific studies in Social Science, Literature, Commerce and Allied areas. This apart, the institution grants study leave for completion of Research, provides with infrastructural back up for research projects undertaken by the faculty members, it has recently sponsored one research project entitled, 'Changing Sex Ratio of students during the three yearperiod within the College Campus and it's Implications'. Five teachers of different departments are currently undergoing UGC-sponsored minor Research Project. Four teachers of this college were awarded Ph. D. degree in recent past while remaining in full time service.

Yes. The college finances Academic seminars conducted by different departments, it has sponsored one Research Project and pays for the expenditure incurred for publication of the research journal, 'Open Eyes'.

However, the students of Sociology Honours and Defense Studies General are to submit project papers as a part of their curriculum. 

Sri Apurba Kumar Sar, Dr. Md. Ahsan Ali, Ms. Susmita Banerjee & Sri Kabiranjan Saha are attached to the West Bengal School Service Commission.

3.4 Extension Activities

3.4.1 How does the institution promote the participation of students and faculty in extension activities? (NSS, NCC, YRC and other NGOs)

The Institution has two important organs, NSS and NCC, which are mainly designed to promote the participation of students and faculty in extension activities. In case of NSS there are three units, each of which has 100 volunteers and out of three units two units are for male students and rest one is for female students. In case of NCC there is only one unit, having capacity of 100 cadets.

There is an arrangement for imparting training to the cadets in the college campus under the supervision of qualified and trained officers. The NCC cadets also attended periodical camps whenever possible.

Three NSS units provide scope for the NSS volunteers to participate in such social works as campus cleaning, inculcating environmental awareness, gardening, coaching classes for poor school children of the locality etc.

For students of the college the agenda of co-curricular activities include NSS as an important item. Teachers & staff attached to the college guide the students in undertaking NSS activities like campus cleaning, cleaning of garbage in and around the campus, greening and beautification of the campus environment, etc. Each year on the Armed Forces Flag Day the students of our college (NCC cadets and NSS volunteers) join hands to collect funds for the welfare of our jawans and their families.

3.4.2 What are the outreach programmes organized by the institution? How are they integrated with the academic curricula?

Different outreach programmes arranged by two organs for promoting extension activites are as follows:

- viii) Participation in Para-sailing activities.
- ix) Participation in Combined Annual training camp, etc.

The above two organs enroll their volunteers at the beginning of the academic session and arrange and organize their different programmes keeping due consideration to the schedules set in the academic activities with the academic curriculum.

3.4.3 How does the institution promote college-neighbourhood network in which students acquire attitude for service and training, contributive to community development?

The two important organs NSS and NCC arrange different programmes either individually or jointly with different NGOs so as to enable the students to acquire attitude for service and training, contribute to community development. Some of our teachers are associated with various social service organizations. For example, Sri Bhabesh Majumdar & Dr. Md. Ahsan ali, lecturers in Department of Bengali, works for the 'Bangiya Saksharata Prasar Samity' and the Ujjivan Samskriti Samstha. The former association renders service to poor boys & girls by providing them with infrastructure for literacy and basic education, the latter renders services for the development of cultural activities and national integration.

Each year on the Armed Forces Flag Day the students of our college (NCC cadets and NSS volunteers) join hands to collect funds for the welfare of our jawans and their families.

As a part of health and hygiene awareness our students clean the college campus as well as the approach road to College by turns once in a month. Further, each year 26 January, Republic Day, is observed as Students' Day on which occasion all the students are involved in a massive cleaning operation. Organization of blood donation camps is a regular annual feature of the campus life of this institution.

3.4.4 What are the initiatives taken by the institution to have a partnership with University / Research institutions / Industries / NGOs etc. for extension activities?

The Institution arranges different programme in collaboration with different NGOs e.g. Kendriya Brotochari Parishad, Lokopali Paribar, etc., so as to promote extension activities.

4.1 Physical Facilities

4.1.1 What are the infrastructure facilities available for

(a) Academic activities?

The institution has 17 Classrooms, one Geography Laboratory, one Computer Laboratory, One seminar room, One Library including Reading room, Faculty reading room & a Book Bank. One large hall, fitted with modern audio-visual systems, is also used for lectures, seminars etc., Besides, the computer awareness laboratory in the rear building has facilities for conducting classes.

In addition to the main library mentioned above, we have separate departmental libraries for all our Honours departments, mainly for the use of departmental teachers and students.

S. R. Lahiri Mahavidyalaya also has two overhead projectors, one LCD projector for facilitating modern method of teaching and learning.

Auditorium

S. R. Lahiri Mahavidyalaya has in her control a spacious auditorium, Rabindra Bhaban, with a capacity of nearly 554 including the balcony. Cultural functions, get-togethers, seminars, memorial lectures, etc. are held in this auditorium. This auditorium has been built by the Panchayat Samity on the land provided by the college and thus is managed jointly. Dr. Md. Ahsan Ali, Lecturer in Bengali is the convener of the Managing Committee.

Stand-by Electrical Generator Facilities

We have three standby electrical generator sets. These generators can support all the fans, lights and pumps during power cuts for a reasonable length of time. There are one deep tube well fitted with submersible water pumps.

(b) Co-curricular activities?

For co-curricular activities, the college has separate rooms for office work. Thus the college has separate NCC office including one storeroom for keeping dresses and equipments; there is also separate room for planning works under NSS units.

(c) Extra –curricular activities and sports?

Sports facilities

Sports and games form an important component of the students' life. There are facilities for a number of indoor and outdoor games such as football, cricket, volleyball, table tennis, badminton, and caroms. We have a large playground attached to the college for cricket and football, while volleyball and badminton are played in the adjacent volleyball and badminton courts. The large playground for football and cricket is also used for athletics such as sprinting, high jump, long jump, shot put, discus throw, javelin throw, etc. We organize regular tournaments in these sports and athletics from August to February every year.

We have developed a multi-gym facility for the students. For this purpose, we have purchased quite a few multi-gym equipments and kept them in a multi-gym room, which the students regularly use in the mornings and evenings. Apart from these new items and equipment we also have traditional apparatus for physical exercises like dumbbells, clubs, skipping ropes, etc.

Every year we hold the sports and athletics meet, wherein a large number of prizes; medals and certificates are awarded to the winners. All the students who have excelled in the various sports events, viz. football, cricket, athletics etc. are felicitated and awarded prizes on this occasion. We usually invite eminent sports persons to preside over these meets and inspire our students to actively engage in physical culture as much as mental culture. The State Government has selected our college to act as a host college for organizing district level inter-collegiate football championship in the current year. This has provided a major boost to sports and athletics in our college.

Cultural and entertainment facilities

The college has a beautiful and well-maintained Hall and an auditorium with a capacity of nearly five hundred and fifty. There is intra-college cultural

competitions in debate, extempore speech, theme development, recitation, essay writing, vocal music and quiz held round the year. Annual cultural fest, **Spandan** is held in December, every year. Handsome prizes are awarded in the form of books, medals and certificates for the winners of the above cultural competitions. On this occasion, the Principal presents a fairly comprehensive report on the college activities during the previous academic session.

Numerous cultural programmes are held in the Campus on several occasions of the year. These include *Rabindra Jayanti,Navinvaran, Saraswati Puja, Annual function*, etc. The students also take part in different intercollegiate cultural competitions organized by various institutions. The S R L Mahavidyalaya **Cine Club** has also been an area of attraction to the students. Equipments necessary for exhibition are kept there under the supervision of the club.



There is technical problem with the dial up connection for internet in the locality and currently there is no provision of Broad band connection. However, it is expected that the bottlenecks would be removed soon and we will introduce Internet services shortly in the library for the use of the students and in the computer laboratory (Charles Babbage Kaksha) for the staff. Some of our faculty members who live in Kolkata and in Kalyani have internet connections in their residences.

Yes, the library services are partially computerized. At present we are using software borrowed from the University of Kalyani. The

cataloguing and accession of books have been computerized and books can be accessed through computers by the students and faculty.

No, we do not have such facilities.

We are yet to develop facilities in the library for the benefit of visuallyand physically-challenged persons because currently we don't have any demand for such facilities.

An institute of higher education is judged by the standard of library it maintains. In this regard we began our journey in this millennium with a handicap created by the devastating flood in the year 2001. It had destroyed one fourth of our library books, as the library area remained submerged by floodwater for a couple of days. Since then we are trying to overcome the shock. We have shifted our library area to the first floor of the Hirendra

Bhaban and also we have planned to construct a new Library building when required grant is received. Presently we have good number of reference books covering subjects of literature, Social Science, Geography including emerging subjects like Defense Studies. Besides, there is adequate number of textbooks.

We are also trying to enrich the journal section of the library. Presently our library subscribes to 16 journals. Yet our target of at least one journal for each department has not been achieved.

The purchase of new books in the library is a continuous process. Every department purchases books throughout the year depending on their requirements. Now in our library total number of copies stands at 9984. We have also computerized the accession system of our library and have planned to provide Internet facilities to our students during college hours. The growing strength of our library can be depicted from the table given below:

Some faculty members prepare their class lectures by using MS-WORD, MS-Excel, and MS-POWERPOINT. Computers are used to prepare slides for OHP and LCD presentations.

Yes, our Institution has hosted a website: www.srlm.org and it is updated annually.

Every year before preparing annual budget, the college authority after consultation with teacher-members of computer sub-committee, takes specific plan for upgrading the computer systems prevailing in the college. For this purpose, some amount is allocated in the budget. In this context, amount received from UGC by way of computer grant are also taken into consideration and specific plan of action is also taken accordingly.

In fact, the college has neither fulltime nor part-time staff for the purpose of maintenance of the computers and their accessories. Because of insufficient fund, we prefer not to have AMC. College has one Health club to look after the matter relating to the Health & Hygiene of the students. 

5.1.3 What are the efforts made by the Institution to minimize the dropout rate and facilitate the students to complete the course?

Drop-out rate of the students of this Institution is decreasing. This institution takes several steps to decrease it. For this it has started counseling of the students to know their socio-economic problems and introduced tutorial classes, especially for the weaker students, as a remedial measure. On the other hand, for the students coming from economically weaker sections, there is provision for reduction of fee structure. In this way we seek to reduce potential drop- out rates.

In fact, the Institution has no such infrastructure to maintain information regarding the students' progression to further studies and for employment. But so far as the information available from informal source, a considerable number of students passing from this Institution are now engaged in further studies or employed. Most of them have admitted in different Universities for Post-Graduate Studies. A good number of students passed from this Institution during the last two years have obtained employment in different sectors like Railways, Post & Telegraph, schools, etc.

We don't have the infrastructure to ascertain this figures. We do have one **Employment cell**, which gives information to students regarding vacancies in different sector. Some times, this cell arranges special training for the prospective candidates to help them face interview boards and group discussion. We have a plan to keep formal records on our alumnus by strengthening our Alumni Association.

For the purpose of facilitating and supporting students for appearing and qualifying in various competitive examinations, the college has one Employment Cell headed by one of the faculty member, Sri Hirak Roy, Lecturer (Sr. Scale) in the Department of Commerce which provides different information to the students in the matter of Employment and arranges different programmes for those students intending to appear at different

Competitive Examinations. Since till date this has been done informally, no formal records are available. But we are hopeful to introduce the formal system very soon.



- 4) Apart from above, Committees for NSS and NCC, Library Committee, Sports Committee, NAAC Steering Committee, etc. However, whenever the presence of the student representative is felt necessary,

the S. U. Secretary is called to take part in the Finance or academic bodies meetings.

The Management of the college i.e., the Governing Body, takes a very positive role in the smooth conduct of the activities of the college.

Its main commitment is to:

- iii) Ensure healthy working environment in the college campus.
- iv) Ensure commitment of the college towards the society.
- v) Ensure optimum utilization and growth and development of Institutional resources.
- vi) Bring the college as a vibrant, socially committed, self-sufficeient, educational institution so as to fulfill the dream of the founder of the Institution.

Its leadership-role and involvement for effective and efficient transaction of the teaching-learning processes may be summed up as follows:

- i) It takes feedback from the teachers who are members of the Governing Body when its meetings are held about the present situation and problems which are faced by the teachers in transacting the teaching-learning processes and also whether there is any suggestion and recommendation available from them.
 - ii) Its takes specific plan of action so as to overcome those problems and making the teaching-learning more active.
 - iii) Its decides whether those plans are properly implemented or not.
 - iv) Its members sometimes make personal contact with the faculty members so as to know the present situation of teaching –learning process.
- 6.1.3 How does the management and the Head of the institution ensure that responsibilities are defined and communicated to the staff of the institution?

At the beginning of the academic session, different committees for looking after different academic and administrative affairs are created in the TC meeting presided over by the Principal who is also the Secretary, G.B. The GB also creates certain committees. The committee members can know about their responsibilities from the TC meeting itself. Further, they are communicated to the employees, teaching and non-teaching, through official notices. This is how the management and the Head of the institution ensure that responsibilities are defined and communicated to the staff of the institution.

All the sub-committees have inter-lapping memberships. Generally, Principal is requested to be present in most of the meetings. The formal resolutions adopted in these committee meetings give adequate information to the management to review the activities of the institution. This apart, the management/Head of the Institution gathers opinions / suggestions from the students, teachers and staff members in various informal ways and analyze these opinion and suggestion so as to review the activities of the Institution.

The head of the Institution on behalf of the college authority arranges different meetings with staff members and also maintain a sound personal contact with each of them so as to encourage and support involvement of the staff for improvement of the effectiveness and efficiency of the Institutional process.


6.1.6. Describe the leadership role of the Head of the institution, in governance and management of the institution.

The administration of this Institution is fairly decentralized. Different plan of actions and activities which are incidental for those plans are designed on the basis of recommendation of different Sub-committees, which are formed by the college authority for different sectors prevailing in this Institution and those Sub-committees are formed for particular purpose. Partial autonomy is in order to perform those activities, which are approved by the college authority.

As stated earlier, different activities which are necessary for smooth running of this Institution are performed through different inter-dependent Sub-committees. Head of the Institution on behalf of the college Governing Body, makes positive communication with those Sub-committees and collect the information regarding problems & prospects faced by them and tries his best to take corrective action to that effect in order to maintain proper

collaboration with those Sub-committees so as to improve the educational provisions of this Institution.

6.2.3 Does the institution have effective internal coordination and monitoring mechanisms? If yes, specify.

Yes, the Institution has effective internal coordination and monitoring mechanism. Different departments and different Sub-committees responsible for different functions maintain proper co-ordination among them at the time of discharging their responsibilities by exchanging their opinion in different meetings and also by informal contacts and the college Governing Body and Head of the Institution on behalf of the Governing Body monitors all the activities of all the departments and Sub-committees for the purpose of maintaining proper co-ordination. This coordination is possible because of the organization of the governing Body. The Teachers' Council sends four of its members. The non-teaching staff council sends two members and Students' Union is represented by the G.S. These apart, there are Govt. and University nominees. So there is larger scope for internal coordination in the matter of academic and administrative affairs.

The Joint Staff Council, alias, Liaison Committee for teaching and non-teaching staff doubles up as Grievance Redressal Cell for the employees. Its main function is to maintain harmonious relation between teaching and non-teaching members. It also recommends measures to be taken for redressing grievances, if any, of employees.

The details of grievances redressed are kept in annexure to be presented to the peer team during validation.

The management formally meets the staff and the students during Annual Day programme and Annual Sports and Games. The meetings of the GB which are held at least six times in an academic year may be considered as the meeting between the management and the staff because some staff members are members of the G.B.

The principal on behalf of the management meet the staff quite often since he is the president of the T.C. and N.T.S. council, which are held quite often (at least six times a year).

The Joint Staff Council or the Liaison Committee is empowered to take adequate measures for preventing sexual harassment of women staff. In fact it gives us pride to put on record of the fact that there had been no sexual harassment cases within the campus till date.

6.3 Strategy Development and Deployment

6.3.1 Describe the procedure of developing the perspective institutional plan. How are the Teachers, Students and Administrators involved in the planning process?

Sudhiranjan Lahiri Mahavidyalaya was originated from the dream of a freedom fighter, Late Sri Sudhiranjan Lahiri, to ensure higher education of the people of a rural, backward and border area so as to bring a change in the socio-economic structure of the locality, keeping in mind of this great objective of the founder of the college. The college authority prepares its

Institutional plans of action time to time by considering opinions and suggestions from different academicians, scholars, teachers, non-teaching staff, students and their parents.

Institutional plan of action is developed by the college authority i.e., the college Governing Body by the following procedure:

- a) At first a rough plan is prepared by the Head of the Institution on the basis of his past experience.
- b) Then he makes discussion with the T. C., NT Staff Council and also S. U., if required.
- c) Then he makes necessary alteration in such plan and places it beforethe Governing body.
- d) Then a detailed discussion is made in the meeting of the Governing Body regarding feasibility of such plan.
- e) Then on the basis of discussion, the final plan is developed and then implemented.

The Annual Day Meeting, Annual Sports and Games meet, and the Induction Programme for the students are the occasions when the Principal outlines the objectives and future plan before all its stake holders. 6.3.4 Has the institution an MIS in place, to select, collect, align and integrate data and information on the academic and administrative aspects of the institution?

The college has the Management Information (MIS) to select, collect, align and integrate data and information on the academic and administrative aspects of the institution. The Teachers' Council used to co-ordinate the system. But now, the NAAC Steering Committee has been assigned with this responsibility.

6.3.5 Does the institution use the various data and information obtained from the feedback, in decision-making and performance improvement? If yes, give details.

Yes, it is the practice of this Institution to collect feedback from the outgoing students to know about their experiences in the college during their three years of study and then utilize such feedback in reviewing the activities of the Institution. The college administration after collecting such feedback makes detailed analysis and determines the opinion of the students and utilizes such opinion in developing future plan of action. Sometimes, on the basis of the feedback the management reallocates duties to correct the shortcomings to ensure the future development.

6.3.6 What are the institution's initiatives for promoting co-operation, sharing of knowledge, innovations and empowerment of the faculty? (Skill sharing across departments, creating/providing conducive environment, etc.)

The **Seminar & Research Forum** of this institution takes all the initiatives for promoting co-operation, sharing of knowledge, innovations and empowerment of the faculty. Now, the convener of the Forum is Sri Amal Kanta Das, and all the Departmental heads are its members. The Forum arranges and collaborates with the Departments for organizing seminars/conferences/ workshops, both state level and national level for the purpose of sharing and improving knowledge and skill of the faculty.

The institution also encourages its faculty to attend National and International seminars by providing them with study leaves. The interdisciplinary journal, OPEN EYES also facilitates exchange of latest ideas, research across different disciplines and across different institutions.

Apart from above, Institution has also encourages the faculty to take up different Research Projects funded by either the UGC or College itself in order to improving skill and providing conducting environment.

6.4 Human Resource Management

6.4.1 What are the mechanisms for performance assessment (teaching, research, service) of faculty and staff? (Self-appraisal method, comprehensive evaluation by students and peers). Does the institution use the evaluations to improve teaching/research of the faculty and service of the faculty by other staff? If yes, how?

The mechanisms which prevail at present in this Institution for performance assessment of faculty are through Self-appraisals of faculties, maintaining of Diary for faculty and staff and collection of feedback from the students. For comprehensive evaluation by students there are documents used for assessment of the performance of faculty are collected from students at the end of academic session and used for improving teaching of the faculty.

6.4.2 What are the welfare measures for the staff and faculty? (mention only those which affect and improve staff well-being, satisfaction and motivation)

There are two types of faculty appointed by the college authority viz. Permanent faculty (who are appointed on the basis of the recommendation of West Bengal College Service Commission) and contractual/part-time/Guest teachers.

In the first case, the following welfare measures are available:

- a) Formation of S.R.L.M. Employees Credit Co-operative Societies Ltd., approved by Nadia District Central Co-operative Bank Ltd.
- b) Allowing faculty F.I.P. scheme for study-leave.
- c) Allowing faculty to take up UGC funded Minor/Major research project and college funded project.

- d) Allowing faculty to attend refresher courses and Orientation courses.
- e) Allowing faculty to attend at different State level, National level, International level seminars, conferences, workshops etc.

In the second case, for the contractual/part-time/Guest teachers, only welfare measure available is the payment of ex-gratia before Durga Puja festival.

In case of staff (Non-teaching), there are two types: permanent and casual. Welfare measure available for permanent staff are:

- a) Formation of S.R.L.M. Employees Credit Co-operative Societies Ltd. approved by Nadia District Central Co-operative Bank Ltd.
- b) Payment of bonus before Durga Puja festival.

 Only welfare measure available for casual staff is the payment of ex-gratia before Durga Puja festival.
- 6.4.3 What are the strategies and implementation plans of the institution, to recruit and retain faculty and other staff who have the desired qualifications, knowledge and skills?

In case of permanent faculty, the college authority is to appoint those candidates, who are recommended by West — Bengal College Service Commission. Regarding condition of service, retention etc. college authority is to follow the rules and regulations framed by the Govt. of West Bengal and the affiliating University time to time. On the other hand in case of non-teaching staff, college authority is to appoint suitable candidates from among the candidates sent by the concerned Employment Exchange. On the basis of selection by duly formed selection Committee as per the rules and regulations framed by the Govt. of West Bengal and the affiliating University.

In case of contractual/part-time/Guest teachers, college authority appoints candidates from among the applied candidates for maximum six months and in case of contractual faculty, for maximum one year. But those faculty members, who have good performance in his/her credit during that said period of service, their services are renewed by Governing Body for a further period of above mentioned duration.

In case of casual staff, (Non-teaching), some are appointed on monthly basis and some are appointed on the basis of daily wage (no work, no pay) system. In both the cases, they are retained if they can possess desired levels of performance.

6.4.4 What are the criteria for employing part-time/adhoc faculty? How are the recruitment conditions of part-time/adhoc faculty different from that of the regular faculty? (e.g. salary structure, workload, specializations).

On the non-availability of the permanent whole time teachers in any particular department, college Governing Body appoints the contractual/part-time/Guest teachers on a purely temporary basis. In that case candidates called for appearing at the selection committee must fulfill the following criteria:

- i) At least 55% marks at Post-graduate level
- ii) NET / SLET / M.Phil./ Ph.D. (preferable)

6.4.5 What are the policies, resources and practices of the institution that support and ensure the professional development of the faculty? The policies and practices which are followed in this institution may be summed up as follows:

- ii) There is a system of allowing the faculty to attend refresher courses and orientation Programmes organized by the UGC affiliated institutions.
- iii) There prevails a system of allowing the faculty to conduct UGC funded Minor research project and college funded project.
- iv) There is a system of allowing the faculty to attend different National /

State / International level seminars, workshops, conferences etc.

v) There is a system of arranging seminars both UGC sponsored or college funded by different department either individually or jointly or by **Seminar and Research Forum** individually or in collaboration with some other association or Institution.

Main resources which are available for conducting any faculty development in this Institution are:

- i) Fund granted by UGC for seminar or conference/workshops/ Minor Research Project as the case may be.
 - ii) College grants for college research project or seminars/conferences/Workshops as the college case may be.

In the recent past, four of our teachers received Ph. D. degree after completion of their research works on part-time basis.

6.4.6 How do you assess the needs of the faculty development? Has the institution conducted any staff development programmes for skill up-gradation and training of the staff? If yes, give details.

The needs for the faculty development programmes are assessed by the individual departments and faculty themselves. Whoever wishes to arrange or

attend any such programme, approaches to the college authority by submitting necessary documents required in a particular case, then on verifying the appeal following rules and regulations, the college authority (for college research project) / UGC (for Minor research project or seminars, conferences etc.) gives permission and grants necessary fund as situation demands.



Criterion VII: Innovative Practices

7.1 Internal Quality Assurance System

7.1.1 What mechanisms have been developed by the institution for quality assurance within the existing academic and administrative systems?

The following mechanisms have been developed by the institution for quality assurance within the existing academic and administrative systems:

- a) Planning for achieving result of each and every department at 100% level of success.
 - b) Increasing motivation of students.
 - c) More stress on qualitative academic growth.
 - d) Giving more stress on co-curricular and extra-curricular activities.
 - e) Ensuring speedy Redressal of students' grievances.
 - f) Evaluation of performance of faculty at the end of every academic session.
- 7.1.2 What are the functions carried out by the above mechanisms in the quality enhancement of the institution?

The following functions are carried out by the institution in the quality enhancement: a) Sex-wise and caste-wise result analysis of each and every department and taking appropriate action on the basis of such analysis.

- b) Giving attention to students individually and introduction of student counseling.
 - c) Introduction of tutorial classes in the class routine.
 - d) Felicitating students who excel in the University Examination
- e) Giving financial support to students coming from economically weaker section.
- f) Giving more stress on NSS, NCC, Games and sports and cultural activities to ensure overall growth of students.
- g) Opening of grievance Redressal cell where there is representative of students including girl student representative.
- h) Collection of academic diary and performance appraisal from the faculty at the end of each academic year.
 - i) Opening of Employment Cell.

7.1.3 What role is played by students in assuring quality of education imparted by the institution?

Students of this Institution play a vital role in the quality assurance of education imparted by the institution. They maintain positive contact with the teachers for solving their problems and they are very much positive in using library facility. Also, we have a book bank which is completely run by the students of this Institution.

Since students have representation in most important bodies of the institution they become the part of decisions made for improving quality. On the individual level, they have the scope to make critical appraisal of the academic and administrative affairs of the college through their feedback reports, which is the most important role played by the students in quality assurance.

7.1.4 What initiatives have been taken up by the institution to promote best practices in the institution? How does the institution ensure that the Best Practices have been internalized?

The following initiatives have been taken up by the institution to promote best practices in the institution:

- a) Considerable emphasis has been laid on research activities.
- b) The practice of awarding best library user has been started.
- c) Publication of student charter, a written statement of the learning rights and obligations of students has been adopted.
 - d) Grievance cell has been created.
- e) Felicitation of students who have excelled in university level examination, in sports and games as well as in extra-curricular activities, has been started.
 - f) Parent-teacher meeting is held at regular interval.

Feed back from students, parents and faculty and non-teaching staff are collected and analyzed at regular interval in order to ensure that the best practices have been internalized.

7.1.5 In which way has the institution added value to the quality enhancement of students?

The Institution has added value to the quality enhancement of students by introducing computer course and providing coaching facility to the passed out students who intended to appear at regional level selection test for appointment of assistant teachers arranged by the West Bengal Central School Service Commission. The senior students and those who have got admission for higher studies in Universities are called to speak/ give seminars organized by the respective departments.

7.2 Inclusive practices

- 7.2.1 What practices have been taken up by the institution to provide access to students from the following sections of the society:
 - a)Socially-backward
 - *b*) Economically-weaker and
 - c)Differently-abled

For providing access to the students from the socially backward and differently-abled sections of the society, the Institution has kept some seats reserved according to the Government rules for the candidates coming from those sections of the society.

On the other hand, for the students coming from economically weaker section of the society, it is the practice of this Institution to grant some financial support by means of granting either full free studentship or half free studentship.

- 7.2.1 What efforts have been made by the institution to recruit Staff from the disadvantaged communities? Specify?
 - a) teaching
 - b) non-teaching

For teaching and non-teaching staff from disadvantaged community, the Institution maintains reservation policy by following 100-point Roster as per Govt. rules. However in case of Part-time/Guest/Contractual teaching staff and casual non-teaching staff no such policy is followed.

7.2.2 What special efforts are made to achieve gender balance amongst students and staff?

In fact no such special efforts are made in this Institution to achieve gender balance amongst students and staff. In practice no discrimination is made between male and female candidates in the matter of admission or in the appointments of staff.

7.2.3 Has the institution done a gender audit and/or any gender-related sensitizing courses for the staff / students? Give details.

Yes, for the purpose of determining the fraud in gender ratio, the college funded a research project entitled 'Changing sex-ratio of the students during three years period within the college campus—its implication' has been started in this Institution. The Principal Investigator for this project is Ms. Mahua Maulik, Senior Lecturer in the department of History.

7.2.4 What intervention strategies have been adopted by the institution to promote the overall development of students from rural/tribal backgrounds?

The college is situated in the rural area and large section of the population is backward and it falls within the SC constituency. The counseling programme and financial support initiated by the college are the interventionist strategies adopted by the institution to promote the overall development of students from rural and backward backgrounds.

7.2.5 Does the institution have a mechanism to record the incremental academic growth of the students admitted from the disadvantaged sections?

Yes. We analyze academic performance of the students also on the basis of castes,, i.e., SC/ST, OBC, etc.

7.2.6 What initiatives have been taken by the institution to promote social-justice and good citizenship amongst its students and staff? How have such initiatives reached out to the community?

Certain programmes are organized by the Institution through its two important wings NCC and NSS, like observation of Independence Day, world Aids Day, Republic day, International Bhasha divas, Organization of tree

plantation programme, Blood Donation Programme, etc. for the purpose of making good citizen. The NSS and NCC units also arranges Programmes on Social Justice and equality, Human Rights, Preservation of the Environment and Bio-diversity, Gender equality, evils of Witch craft and Dowry system, convergence of religious thoughts, etc. In all such programmes, apart from the student and staff, local youths from outside the Institution also participate. This is how healthy social practices of our students and this institution reaches out to the community.

7.3 Stakeholder relationships

7.3.1 How does the institution involve all its stakeholders in planning, implementation and evaluation of the academic programmes?

According to existing rules and regulations of the college, final decision about the academic programmes is taken by the concerned authority of the affiliating University. The college Governing Body only sends proposal to the University for the Academic Programmes. But before taking final decision about sending such proposal, it takes opinion from the Teachers' Council, the Students' Union, and different academic experts. Considering opinion of all those stakeholders, it takes final decision whether such a proposal will be made or not. Then the Undergraduate Board of Studies of the affiliating University where the college has also representatives takes final decision about the planning, implementation and evaluation of academic programmes.

The evaluation of academic programme is done by the respective departments of the institution and is discussed in the TC and GB where there are representatives of students and local self-govt. institution, i.e., Panchayat Samity. Thus, eventually, all the stakeholders get involved in the planning, implementation and evaluation of the academic programmes.

7.3.2 How does the institution develop new programmes to create an overall climate conducive to learning?

The colleges of West Bengal can not develop new programme on their own. They are the prerogatives of the affiliating University. The authority by considering opinion and suggestion of all the stakeholders and making due consultation with them, only adopts new programme to create an overall climate conducive to learning.

7.3.3 What are the key factors that attract students and stakeholders, to the institution and result in stakeholder satisfaction?

The following key factors which prevail in this institution attract students and stakeholders, to the institution and result in stakeholder satisfaction:-

- i) Academic performance;
- ii) Cleanliness of college premises;
- iii) Discipline and punctuality of each and every section of the college.
- iv) Different extra-curricular and co-curricular activities
- v) College Library.
- 7.3.4 How does the institution elicit the cooperation from all stakeholders to ensure overall development of the students, considering the curricular and co-curricular activities, research, community orientation and the personal/spiritual development of the students?

The authority of the college exchanges opinions with different stakeholders by arranging meetings of different bodies formed with different stakeholders in different occasions (say, Annual Day Programmes) formally elicit the cooperation from all stakeholders to ensure overall development of the students considering the curricular and co-curricular activities, research, community orientation and the personal/spirirtual development of the students. Apart from that the Head of the Institution on behalf of the college authority keeps positive personal contact with all the stakeholders for the aforesaid purpose.

7.3.5 How do you anticipate public concerns in your current and future programme offerings and operations?

The college authority considers feedback from the students, parents and other sections of the community about the existing programmes and collects opinion and suggestion from different stakeholders so as to judge and anticipate public concerns in the current and future programmes.

7.3.6 How does the institution promote social responsibilities and citizenship roles among the students? Does it have any exclusive programme for the same?

One the basic objectives of Higher Education system of a Nation are to promote social responsibilities and citizenship role among the students. As such authority of this Institution designs and operates each and every activity in such way that it can promote social responsibilities and citizenship role among the students.

Yes, its two important organs NSS and NCC, arrange different programmes e.g. tree plantation programme, Blood donation camp, First aid training programme for the same.

7.3.7 What are the institutional efforts to bring in community-orientation in its activities?

As stated earlier, the geographical location and historical background of this Institution have imposed a heavy burden upon the authority of this institution to take an active role in promoting socio-cultural and socio-economic environment of the locality where it prevails. As such while designing and operating each activity, it considers how much interest will be projected to the community. It takes into consideration of the socio-economic environment of the locality, the opinion of different academicians, income pattern of the parents, major problems of the locality where it prevails so as to bring in community orientation in its activities.

7.3.8 How does your institution actively support and strengthen the neighborhood communities? How do you identify community needs and determine areas of emphasis for organizational involvement and support?

The Institution by or through its different organs arranges different programmes in the neighborhood localities, actively supports and strengthens the neighborhood communities by allowing students and faculty in participating in the said programmes.

The Institution keeps close contact with different local bodies, NGO's, eminent persons so as to identify community needs and determine arrears of emphasis for organizational involvement and support.

7.3.8 How do the faculty and students contribute in these activities?

Faculty and students jointly design those activities and take part in these activities and they actively try to make involve the local youths, different eminent persons and all local people in these activities.

7.3.9 Describe how your institution determines student satisfaction, relative to academic benchmarks? Do you update the approach in view of the current and future educational needs and challenges?

The Institution by collecting and analyzing feedback from the outgoing students, discusses with the students representative in the grievance cell and through the student Union determines the student satisfaction.

Yes, the Institution updates the approach in view of future educational needs and challenges. For example, in the past only the lecture method was used to impart education. Now, the interactive method is more useful and popular. In the recent past, we are using technology, i.e., OHP. LCD projector, etc. for imparting education to enhance students' satisfaction in learning.

7.3.10 How do you build relationships?

- > to attract and retain students
- > to enhance students performance and
- > to meet their expectations of learning

In order to attract and retain students, the Institution makes continuous review and updates its academic activities and designs and develops extracurricular and co-curricular activities in the interest of the students.

In view of enhancing students' performance the institution makes proper analysis of its academic performance, performance of the students in different extra-curricular and co-curricular activities and felicitates those students who excel in different field.

In order to meet expectation of learning, the faculty continuously notices the needs and problems and tries to reach solutions to those problems and properly informs the college authority about the problems of the students.

7.3.11 What is your complaint management process? How do you ensure that these complaints are resolved promptly and effectively? How are complaints

aggregated and analyzed for use in the improvement of the organization, and for better stakeholder-relationship and satisfaction?

The college authority provokes the stakeholders to make complain, if any. The institution has a mechanism to collect and preserve complaints and analyze those complaints and takes appropriate action for prompt and effective solutions of those complaints.

The college authority from time to time makes proper analysis and meets with different stakeholders and publishes its annual report every year so as to ensure that those complaints have been properly addressed.

The complaints which appear before the college authority are at first referred to different organs concerned with the subject matter of the complaints and those are properly analyzed, then correctible action is recommended to the authority for better stakeholder-relationship and satisfaction.

The Department does not have a separate building or a wing of its own, being housed along with all the other humanities and social sciences departments in the college main building. In a sense, therefore, the entire main building of the college is at the disposal of the department for classes etc. However, there is a small departmental cubicle that houses a small departmental library, besides acting as a departmental teachers' room for meetings etc.





- The students are quizzed on their current perception of the subject taught.
- Assignments are given and checked regularly.
- We have a system of formal class tests.
- ➤ Each teacher undertakes review classes from time to time where the understanding of the students on the topic is assessed and necessary remedial actions are undertaken.

13.Placement record of the past students and the contribution of the department to the student placements

The college has no infrastructure to keep placement records of the students However; the Employment Cell of the college keeps the students aware about different job vacancies. The Cell is supervised by Sri Hirak Roy of the Department of Commerce.

14. Significant achievements of the department, faculty and students during the past two years.

The department has organised two UGC sponsored seminars, one state-level and other National level Conference in collaboration with other departments. The department was also instrumental in publishing one edited volume entitled, 'Globalisation and Problem of Unemployment in India'.

In spite of the fact that the Commerce department generally gets students who find unable to secure seats in the town-based colleges, and also that they are not highly motivated to study the subject which is not a school subject, we have found that these very students, within their limitations, do get a foundation of the subject under the able guidance of the faculty members. This rigour may not achieve an immediate result in outstanding performances in the final B.Com. Examination, however, the spirit inculcated propels them to higher

levels of excellence in their future academic pursuits. This is reflected in the fact that many of these students secure admission to universities and some of them distinguish themselves in various professions.

15.Plan of action of the department for the next five years

The present course structure in Commerce has an urban bias in the sense that students with urban background are in a position to appreciate the subject better. But, since most of our students come from rural areas, they take a long time to feel at home with the syllabus. We plan to work on the remedial measures to bridge this rural-urban gap.

16.Any other highlights:

The department has a full-fledged teaching faculty with five full time teachers. Active teaching assistance is also obtained from the principal of the college. Teacher-student ratio being very favourable, we can ensure direct contact with the students both in and outside the class. Relationship between the teachers and the students are very cordial. Further, many of the faculty members are engaged in active research. In our state, Commerce is not a school subject. So the Commerce students lack the scope of being absorbed in the school services. This makes the subject less attractive to a section of the students. The demand for this subject in rural areas is therefore declining. Some of our students crave for private tuition to which they have been accustomed since school days. This is in spite of the intensive care and teaching by out teachers in the class room. Some times this parallel system comes into severe conflict with the methods and course content offered by our faculty in the class. A confused set of students therefore fail to perform well in the university examinations. This threat of private tuition is not unique to our college and we are gradually succeeding in our crusade against this tendency by motivating the students to realise that the private tuition is counterproductive and those who do not fall a prey to this stand a better chance of succeeding in their examinations and achieving better results.

Department of Bengali was established in the year 1970. The Department does not have a separate building or a wing of its own, being housed along with all the other humanities and social sciences departments in the college main building. However, there is a small departmental cubicle that houses a small departmental library, besides acting as a departmental teachers' room for meetings etc.

The department offers two programmes of Study B. A. (Honours in Bengali) and B. A. (General) as per the syllabus of the University of Kalyani.

5. Learning Resource:

Library books on Political Science and on allied disciplines are the main learning resources of this department. Nevertheless, he continues to make Prospectus and Admission Form and Academic Calendar every academic year and Convener, Admission Committee. Apart from it, he has been working as the Coordinator of Netaji Subhas Open University Study Centre located in the college.

Beside all this, **Sri Kamal Pal** sets question in different papers in Political Science at the Under Graduate level pertaining to the University of Kalyani. He also examines answer scripts of University examinations, and until recently, he has been a member of the Under Graduate Board of Studies, University of Kalyani.

The department of Sociology is the smallest department in the college in terms of its intake capacity, faculty members as well as student strength. Initially, the

department started with the permission to confer General course since 1986. From 1995-96 sessions, Honours course is being taught in this department. As the college was affiliated to the University of Calcutta since its inception, the department did follow the syllabus and curricula of the same university. The scope for teaching, evaluation etc, were also of similar to that of the departments of other colleges affiliated to the University of Calcutta. At present it follows the syllabai of University of Kalyani. The department does not have a separate building of its own, being housed along with all other departments in the College main building. In a sense, therefore, the entire main building of the College is at the disposal of the department for classes etc. However, there is a small departmental cubicle that houses a small departmental Library, besides acting as a departmental teachers' room for meeting etc.

C. Evaluative Report of the Departments

Department of Economics

Introduction:

Department of **Economics** started its journey in the academic year 1986 – 87 under the direct patronage of the University of Calcutta. It was indeed a brave decision from the point of view of the authority concerned which opened a new avenue of reading **Economics** as a subject of this backward, rural, border area though the subject is not being taught as a Honours subject. For opening Honours in **Economics**, Mathematics and / or science stream of studies is necessary as a complimentary to this subject. There are many reasons for not having Mathematics or science stream of studies opened up here.

There is no such departmental building nor has such specially mentioned facilities like departmental library, departmental computer facility with internet connection etc. of its own due to the shortage of fund. Instead, there is only a small departmental cubicle, meant for the departmental head to make a departmental office to meet the teachers and students of the department so long a new building or block is not made. At present the college offers three programmes of Study:







C. Evaluation Report

Department: Library

1.Brief History:

The Central Library of the Sudhiranjan Lahiri Mahavidyalaya was established in 1966. The Library was housed on the ground floor of the Mahavidyalaya from the establishment year of the college. But in the year 2004, it was shifted to the present library building, named "Ram Mohan Kasha" (Lending Room) and "Vidyasagar Kaksha" (Reading Room) in first floor which has a plinth area of 19,137 sq mts.

The Library has a good collection of carefully selected textbook, reference books, periodicals and magazines on the subjects Bengali, English, Philosophy, History, Sociology, Political Science, Geography, Economics, Commerce, Defense Study and Physical Education. This collection comprises of 11,780 books at present. At present the library subscribes 8 Indian periodicals and 4 popular Magazines and 1 Newspaper. The faculties and students can make use of books for lending as well as reading purpose and periodicals only for reading purpose. In addition, the library has same electronic sources like floppy, CD and cassettes on different subjects. An average of 40 students, 9 teachers and the others visit the library on regular basis. More then 600 new members enroll annually. The total numbers of library members exceed 2000at present.

The technical section processed near about 9,000 books before releasing them to the stacks for wider use. Details of the newly acquired book beside the manual catalogue were entered computer network for keeping up to date record.

The library maintains a computer for the use of students and faculty members in the reading room for acquiring information regarding the total and current collection of the library. The CDS/ISIS software package is used for computerization of the library. Presently, the library is partially automated and going to be fully digitized in future.

The library is also equipped with audio-visual equipment to impart teaching and learning programmes effectively. These include tape recorder, television and projector. The library has produced 3 staffs including Libarian at various levels to manage the various activities of library. The "Library Week" from November 14 to November 21 and organizes different cultural competitions and programmes to inspire the students for increasing their reading habit. Awards are given to the winner and the best reader of the library in every year.

A Committee is constituted to manage and supervise the activities of the library properly. The terms of reference of the committee is to evolve a strategy for the optimal use of the funds available for book as well as journal subscription. Beside this, budget allocation, maintenance, preservation, binding etc. are also coordinated by the committee.

A proposal to set up internet facilities on the campus was finalised. It is expected to commission these facilities in the beginning of next year to coordinate among all the sections through LAN in future. A proposed plan is submitted for establishing new "Library Bhavan" for central library at the central position of the college. The library is planning to introduce a new internet section and to establish a separate reprographic section in future in order to supply suitable manpower in the changing information environment. The library is trying its best to come to the forefront of the colleges and is committed to keep up the tradition to become a centre of excellence.




